Culinary class makes pasta

The culinary arts classes at the high school invited Mrs. Karen Long to demonstrate her knowledge of the ravioli making process. Long, a health occupations instructor at HCHS, is from an Italian heritage and learned the process from her mother and aunts, who learned the process from their mother, mother-in-law,

and grandmothers.

Long, her mother, and Long's sisters meet each fall to make ravioli pasta, which they then stuff with meat mixture. Usually, they make around 130 dozen to be divided, frozen, and then used for their families the rest of the year.

The culinary classes spent three days cooking and grinding the meat mixture filling. On the fourth day, the students made the dough and shaped it using tools designed for mak-

ing ravioli. They also made various sizes of noodles.

"The best part of this time-consuming task was the tasting," stated Mrs. Debra Harville, culinary arts instructor. Several long tables in the classroom were draped with strands of pasta in the drying process. All classes involved enjoyed the samples. 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to stop the .01¢ sales tax

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The resolution to repeal

When the voters approved this .01¢ sales tax in 1997, you were told verbally, through paid ads in the Courier, and by printed literature and proposed plans exactly how this money would be spent. After the renovation of the High School, none of the other promises have been kept. This tax has generated excess money that has been misused and wasted. Look at the 66 acres purchased from school board member David Long, acting as executor for the Louis Black estate, for \$525,000. The school board does not now plan to use it. If this excess money had not been there, they couldn't have wasted it.

A school for North Elementary has not and will not be built. Only emergency maintenance has been done to any of the school buildings.

The advertised promise made by the school board that every penny generated by the .01¢ sales tax would be used on our schools has not happened. The county spent interest money from this account on its operational budget.

The Savannah City Commission found a loophole that allowed them to withdraw from the original agreement. The city now takes one-half (1/2) of this tax for its operational budget.

If the City of Savannah needs this money, state law allows the city to enact its own sales tax. So, the claims that this would have to raise your property tax is NOT TRUE.

This .01¢ sales tax, with no earmarks or specific purpose, allows the school board, county commission, and city commission to liberally spread and waste this money. There is no end or cut-off date for this tax.

The claims that the county would have to raise the property tax also is NOT TRUE. The county by referendum, can enact another sales tax, but these wasteful officials know that you, the voter, would demand that every penny of it be earmarked for a specific purpose and that it have a cut off date. Don't be deceived again.

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
